Council Member Parkhurst: attended Representative Judy Chu's Artistic Discovery Awards Ceremony at the Huntington with art from high school students from around the San Gabriel Valley. One of the Sierra Madre residents received an honorable mention. Attended the Sierra Madre Honors dinner on April 19, 2023, and it was a fantastic event. Congratulations to all of the honorees. On Earth Day there was a dedication to the landscaping at the Post Office which Representative Chu, Director Prince from the Water District, the owner of the building, Bob Spears, and Jim Walsworth attended. The event was a great recognition of the work done there and a great example of native drought-tolerant plants. Attended the Earth Day fair at the park which was well attended by city departments with a lot of information and mulch was there from the SMART program for people to take home. Attended two Clean Power Alliance meetings and they are about to launch their annual solicitation for new renewable energy projects.

Council Member Lowe: attended the Honors Dinner and it was nice to see past awardees and all the people who contribute to this community all in one space. The Friends of the Library are hosting an Art Fair on May 6 and 7, 2023 from 9:30 am to 5:00 pm. Attended the Chamber of Commerce meeting via Zoom on April 11, 2023, where they recognized the Wistaria Festival event and they were planning for the Honors dinner.

Council Member Goss: attended the Community Services Commission meeting on April 17, 2023. The Commission approved three different special event permits. The events approved are the Sierra Madre Community Nursery Carnival on May 6, 2023, the Community Bike Ride and Wellness Fair on April 29, 2023, and the Mount Wilson Trail Race on May 26 and 27, 2023. Attended the Honors Dinner and congratulations to Mike Bamberger for being recognized as the 2022 Citizen of the Year. Stated the Mayor and Susan Henderson did a great job as MC at the Honors Dinner. Presented Dan Alley with last year's Mayor's Award for his assistance as a realtor when the city purchased the Bank of America building last summer. Dan Alley donated his commission which was a big part of securing the deal. Attended the Earth Day event. Participated in the orientation meeting for members of the Foothill Workforce Development Board. The first meeting will be representing the City on the Board in early May.

Mayor Garcia: attended the Honors Dinner and presented some Certificates of Recognition to some of the City employees. Recognized the Wistaria Vine for the Wistaria Award and honored the two new residents in town that purchased the southern and northern residences that the Vine occupies. The residents from the main house the vine occupies were in attendance and they were thanked and recognized. It was an honor to be in a room full of all the people who have contributed so much to the community. Attended the Earth Day event which was a great event. Attended the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments meeting on April 20, 2023, and pulled the 2023 Federal and State Legislation positions of the COG and discussed that at length. There were presentations on recycling and the organics program. At the end of the meeting, there were discussions and he brought up the bears with the COG and the other city leaders that were in attendance. There were about five or six Foothill Community Mayors like Pasadena, La Verne, and Claremont who are interested because the bear and coyote populations have ballooned in their neighborhoods as well. We are looking for a smart change in the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Wildlife Commission. Pasadena Mayor Gordo recommended a task force be put together to handle some of these issues. The Friends of the Library will be hosting an Art Fair at Memorial Park on May 6 and 7, 2023 from 9:30 am to 5:00 pm. There will be art vendors, crafts for kids, food trucks, live music, and a silent auction. The Community Services Commission will have two vacancies and one vacancy on the Natural Resources Commission on July 1, 2023.

**a) CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION 23-28 APPROVING CERTAIN DEMANDS**

It is recommended that the City Council approve Resolution 23-28 approving payment of City Warrants in the aggregate amount of \$868,744.39; Sierra Madre Library Warrants in the aggregate amount of \$6,094.68; and Payroll Transfer in the aggregate amount of \$464,777.39 for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2023.

**c) CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION 23-29, INITIATING PROCEEDINGS FOR THE LEVY AND COLLECTION OF ASSESSMENTS AND ORDERING THE PREPARATION OF THE REPORT FOR THE DOWNTOWN LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING MAINTENANCE ASSESSMENT DISTRICT**

It is recommended that the City Council authorize NBS to prepare and file with the City Clerk, the Engineer's Report concerning the levy and collection of assessments within the Downtown Landscaping Lighting Maintenance Assessment District for the Fiscal Year commencing July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2024.

**d) CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION 23-12 DECLARING THE MISMANAGEMENT OF LOCAL BLACK BEAR POPULATION A THREAT TO PUBLIC SAFETY**

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution 23-12, including the request to the Fish and Game Commission to agendaize an item for the next scheduled meeting and transmittal of Resolution 23-12 to the Director of the Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Secretary for Natural Resources, the Fish and Game Commission and elected state representatives.

**f) CONSIDERATION OF ACCEPTANCE OF THE CALIFORNIA ENERGY COMMISSION CAL-APP GRANT FOR ONLINE SOLAR PERMITTING**

It is recommended that the City Council accept the awarded California Energy Commission Cal-APP Grant in the amount of \$40,000.

Pursuant to Government Code section 65852.21, subdivision (j), and Government Code section 66411.7, subdivision (n), staff recommends the City Council finds the adoption of this Ordinance is not a project for purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and is statutorily exempt.

**CEQA FINDINGS**

This activity accepts grant funds to update online permitting infrastructure and has no potential for resulting in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment, and as such, is not a "project" subject to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) 14 Cal. Code Regs § 15378.

Mayor Garcia brought the matter to the City Council for discussion.

Item A – no questions from Council.

Item B – Council Member Parkhurst are there any forecasts on PERS performance and how far out does the performance projection go? Finance Director Guirola-Leon responded that speaking to the actuary and he did not want to provide a projection. However, he did say

we are looking at about 5.5 investment returns instead of the expected assumption of 6.8. There will be a negative effect in the next evaluation received in August 2024. In July we will receive the expected projection and then we will be able to see the actual projection. With the policy in place, there is an 85% minimum and it has to be analyzed internally every year to keep managing it and presenting it if it ever goes below that amount. Mayor Pro Tem Kriebs asked if the forward-looking projection influences the amount that we are budgeting currently for the next fiscal year with what we think the projection might be. Finance Director Guirola-Leon responded, yes that is correct. Mayor Garcia asked if there was a policy to fund the raining day fund. Finance Director Guirola-Leon responded that there is not a current formal policy, however, there is a trust for investments and it can be discussed if we want to include an additional investment based on how the fund is doing now. Negative returns have been seen as of now but it does move with the market.

Glenn Lambdin: thanked staff for all their hard work on the resolution. Thanked Council for taking the lead on this project and recognizing two decades of mismanagement by the Fish and Wildlife.

Shirley Moore: read a letter she wrote to the Mountain Views News editor in October 2022 regarding the bears living in Sierra Madre.

City Clerk Aguilar advised that no e-mails had been received.

Seeing no one else come forward, Mayor Garcia brought the matter back to Council for discussion.

## **DISCUSSION**

### **1. CITY OF SIERRA MADRE LOCAL TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM**

It is recommended that the City Council provide direction to staff regarding potential updates to the City's Local Transportation Program.

Management Analyst Carlson gave the report.

Mayor Garcia brought the matter to the City Council for questions.

Mayor Garcia asked how often the route on the roundabout to Ralph's occurs. Management Analyst Carlson responded that it is rare and that we do not get destination data. We are provided with ridership

totals and feedback from Community Services Commission and the Senior Services Commission. Mayor Garcia asked if the funds are from Prop A funds. Management Analyst Carlson responded, yes, the funds are dedicated to the local transportation program. Mayor Garcia asked if the Prop A funds pay for the upkeep and the purchase of new vehicles. Management Analyst Carlson responded that it is possible that Prop A funds could go toward a new vehicle. The vehicles we have were paid for with a federal grant. Analyst Carlson does not know if the vehicles we have used were Prop A funds or at least not the majority of the Prop A. Mayor Garcia asked if any other commissions or if any residents have mentioned the services. Management Analyst Carlson responded that he heard Metro Micro is not a solution. Speaking with Metro they advised it is still a pilot program and they will not move off of that and that we should not assume we are getting one or both lines back.

Council Member Lowe asked if there is any data on why and when we lost the Metro system. Management Analyst Carlson responded that he has been asking for Metro Micro data including complaints and have not received any of it.

Council Member Parkhurst what would be the focus of the sub-committee if one is formed? Management Analyst Carlson responded that the focus would not only be the scope of work but also to come up with something more creative and more effective than just adjusting the routes. Council Member Parkhurst asked if we did an RFP, and how we get the community involved. Management Analyst Carlson responded that the public would be presented with the results from the RFP and we would be searching for feedback. Council Member Parkhurst asked if the county has any transportation services or programs, or does it only offer Foothill Transit. Management Analyst Carlson responded that Access Services are available specifically for ADA and that is something used in town. Council Member Parkhurst asked if Sierra Madre falls under a transportation district. Management Analyst Carlson responded that Sierra Madre does not. There is a transportation district centered in Duarte and that may be considered an Eastern San Gabriel Valley District.

Mayor Garcia opened public comment.

Seeing no one come forward, Mayor Garcia closed public comment.

City Clerk Aguilar advised that no e-mails had been received for this item.

The Mayor brought the matter back to the Council for comments.

Council provided direction to staff and would like them to extend the contract short-term while staff negotiates with Foothill Transit and makes minor adjustments. Council provided direction to staff to create a sub-committee with members from the Senior Community Commissions, Community Services Commission, Natural Resources Commission, a Council Member, the general public, and possibly a youth. Council Member Goss volunteered to sit on the sub-committee.


